Tom's "Turn a Bowl" Demo-

Part 1 The Tool

Tom started his demo by discussing tools. Tom recommends starting with three tools instead of a box of tools. These tools are a 1/2" Bowl Gouge, 3/8" Spindle Gouge, and a 1/8" Parting Tool. Once you learn how to use these tool you can add other tools as needed depending on what you are turning.

After discussing tools we discussed way of mounting a bowl blank on the lathe. There are many ways to mount a piece of wood on the lathe. Common ways are to use a Screw Check, Face Plate, Spur Center, Safety Center (Cup Center).



The benefits of each method was discussed. Using a rotary cup center in the tail stock was also discussed. Pins will also try and follow the same path so it is hard to adjust the location of the tail stock end of the blank by small amounts. Several live centers allow their pins to be removed so that they can be used as a cup center.



Removing the pin from a live center allows it to be adjust by small amounts. When the pin is left in it will try and return to the same location

The size and orientation of tenons included gripping the wood with an expansion or contraction action. Outside diameter is set so that the size of the tenon allows the jaws to almost close. This provides the greatest percentage of contact between the tenon and the chuck. When using an expansion grip, ensure that you leave enough wood so that it will not split

Part 2

The size and shape of the foot or lack of foot was discussed. Ways to turn a tenon compression or expansion while leaving the most wood for the bowl were suggested. Was to remove the foot or shape the foot



A group discussion on the shape of the bowl took place. A general consensus for the demo bowl was to round over the top, make the bottom 1/3 the size of the major diameter, and to add accent lines.



The demo bowl was reverse chucked to remove the foot. A waste block and be mounted in your chuck or on a face plate. The outside of the waste block can be turned to fit inside of the mouth of the bowl. If you waste block is a little too small or to reduce marring the bowl a piece of paper towel, leather, or a mouse pad can be placed between the waste block and the bowl. If you leave the mark from the tail stock when you turn your tenon this can be used to align the bowl to the orientation it was turned from.


Cable Driven Spiral System...
