Tenons on the bottom of your piece can either be turned away or turned into a foot.

Tom Mogford - Threaded Box

Prepare the urchin shell

Take measurements of top and bottom opening.

One member suggested using non-expanding spray foam to give support to the shell.

Turn a cone and glue sandpaper too it. The cone can be turned to 45 degrees. This will make the opening round and even. The natural opening in not round and has nodules that protrude into the opening.

Mount the cone in the lathe. Gently press the uneven holes at the top and bottom against the cone.

This will make the holes round and create a 45 degree recess in the top and bottom of the Urchin Shell.

Mod Podge can be used to apply gold leaf to the shell.

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Supply gold leaf to the shell.

Use a brush to clean off loose leaf.

Plastic wrap can me laid down, pieces of leaf spread on plastic wrap. The plastic wrap and then be wrapped around the shell.



Mod Podge can be used to seal and embellish the urchin shell.

Tom Mogford - Threaded Box

Measure the diameter of the opening. Toms shell had openings 1 3/8" and 7/8"

Rough turn you blank. Tom used Cherry.

Mount you blank between centers. Turn a tenon on each end. Part off the finial. Leave the Icicle mounted in the chuck.

Turn the icicle.

Turn a portion of the Icicle and sand he Icicle as you go .

Working on the finial in stages allows the thicker wood to support the piece.

Tom turned a feature at the top and bottom of the Icicle.

At the top of the bottom feature (remember the Icicle points down) a 45 degree angle is turned that is wider than the bottom opening is turned. This is to align with the bottom opening of the urchin shell.



Turning the icicle and sanding as you go leaves more wood to support the pressure.

Tom Mogford - Threaded Box

Drill a hold for a tooth pick or small skewer at the top of the icicle using a pin vice.

Mount the finial blank in the chuck using the tenon that you already turned.

True up the face and make a dimple.

Drill a hole for a tooth pick or small skewer in the bottom of the finial using a pin vice.

Hold the urchin shell up to the tenon to make sure you have a good fit.

Turn down the top of the finial. Remember the Finial points up.

Sand as you progress to provide support.

Using a skewer to attach the icicle and finial to the shell makes the ornament lighter since there is not a block of wood inside the ornament.

Use a pin vice to drill a hole in the top of the finial for the eyelet or wristed wire in order to hang the ornament.



The skewer provides a light weight way attach the finial and icicle.

Coring System

Come to a mentor workshop and take advantage of the clubs Coring System. Coring a bowl allows you to turn several bowls out of a single piece of wood.

You can see Dave made 4 bowls and another small inner blank from his piece of wood. Turning a bowl the standard way would have resulted in one bowl.

This is useful when turning figured or expensive wood as you can turn multiple bowls for the cost of one bowl blank.

The Coring system is for the Powermatic lathe. Sign up with Dave Worden if you want to use the Coring System
