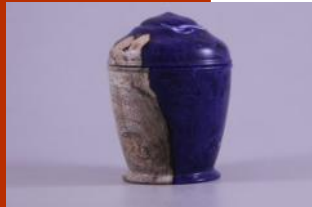

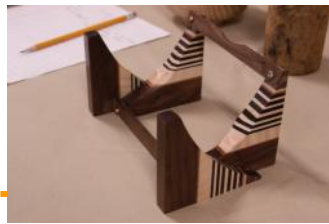

Paul Guilbeaut - Cardboard Box

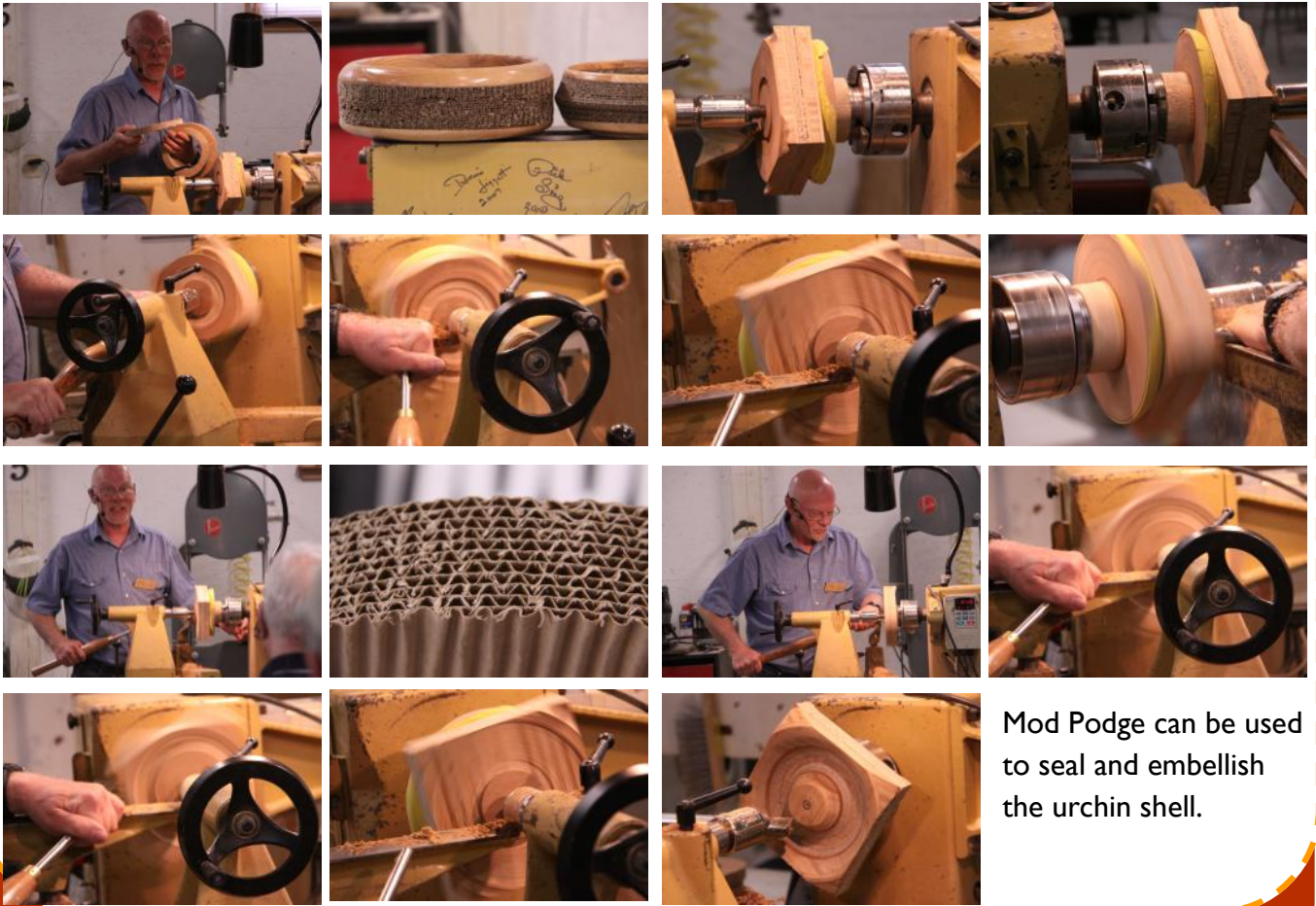
Paul builds his cardboard bowl blanks by gluing together sheets or corrugated cardboard. The sheets of card board are then glued between two boards. Regular wood glue is used for this project. The blank for the demo was made using two sheets of bamboo.

A jam chuck is created by gluing craft foam to a flat board such as MDF. MDF comes flat and does not typically need to be trued up. A waste block can be glued to the board to turn a tenon on so the jam chuck can be easily mounted in a chuck.

Mounting the blank between the jam chuck and the live center. Use Short cuts to cut out a circle from the middle of the blank. Turn the center of the circle into a tenon to mount the bowl in a chuck. The underside of the bowls rim can be turned at this time as well.

Mount the bowl in a chuck and turn the inside of the bowl.

Shavings become fibrous with you reach the card board. You may have to clear the flute of the bowl gouge.



Mod Podge can be used to seal and embellish the urchin shell.

Paul Guilbeaut - Cardboard Box

Sand the inside of the bowl. Be careful sanding the cardboard section it will sand away quickly. Reverse chuck the bowl and finish turn the bottom. Sand the bottom.

If you glue just the outer ring of the cardboard to the wood it will clean easier when turning the inside of the bowl.

Turn a tenon to a nub. Sand the bottom of the bowl to remove the nub

You can make your own sanding disks. Use a pipe with a ground point to cut hook and loop sandpaper to the needed diameter. A threaded cap can be used to protect one end of the pipe and a flange can be used to protect the other end of the pipe and allows the pipe to stand up. With the cap on use a dead blow hammer to stamp out section of hook and loop sandpaper you can buy in bulk from Klingspor.

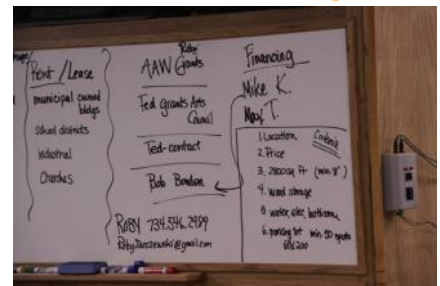
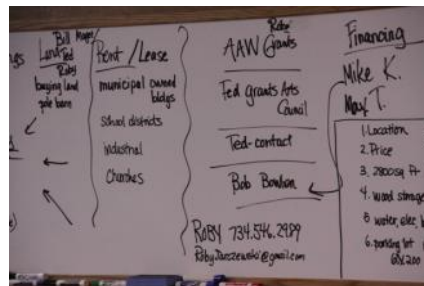
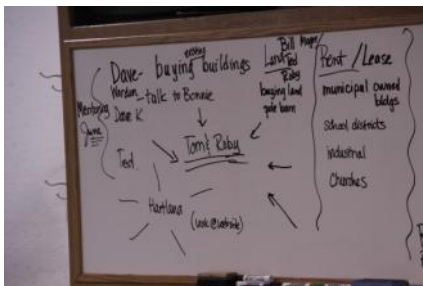
If you are aware of an available building or land the club may be able to purchase or use please let an officer know.

Coring System

Come to a mentor workshop and take advantage of the clubs Coring System. Coring a bowl allows you to turn several bowls out of a single piece of wood.

You can see Dave made 4 bowls and another small inner blank from his piece of wood. Turning a bowl the standard way would have resulted in one bowl.

This is useful when turning figured or expensive wood as you can turn multiple bowls for the cost of one bowl blank.

The Coring system is for the Powermatic lathe. Sign up with Dave Worden if you want to use the Coring System
